LENTEN EVENINGS OF FAITH AND FELLOWSHIP:

Join Father Sullivan on the Tuesday evenings of Lent at 7:00 p.m., in the Activity Center, as we consider Bishop Robert Barron's Light from Light: A Theological Reflection on the Nicene Creed. Each evening will consist of a video by Bishop Barron, Questions for Reflection and Discussion, and an opportunity to grow in the Catholic Faith with one another. The Nicene Creed was authored by the Bishops of the Catholic Church gathered at the Council of Nicaea in 325 AD. The Creed was written to proclaim the Catholic Faith, in its essentials, concerning the Incarnation of the Eternal Word of the Father, made flesh in the Virgin's womb, and the nature and relationship of the Blessed Trinity; Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The Nicene Creed is a statement of faith that all believing Christians profess. In 2025, we will celebrate the seventeen hundredth anniversary of its promulgation. Father Barron's book was a Christmas gift from Saint Thomas Aquinas Parish to everyone who attended Mass here in celebration of the Nativity of the Lord. Almost 400 books were distributed. A few remain. Please feel free to pick one up after Mass. Father Sullivan will facilitate each Tuesday evening session. Come join other parishioners as we grow in faith and understanding during this year's Lenten journey.

STEWARDSHIP

CRADLE OF THE FAITH: THE FORLORN SHEEP:

The roots of the Catholic faith in Ohio began with the persistent requests of Jacob Dittoe for a priest to administer the sacraments to Catholics living in the wilderness near Somerset, Ohio. Archbishop John Carroll, S.J. of Baltimore answered those requests by sending Father Edward D. Fenwick, O.P., who offered the first Mass in Jacob Dittoe's log cabin in September 1808 and who dedicated St. Joseph Church, Ohio's first Catholic church at Somerset on December 6, 1818. Peter Thomas and William Noll will jointly present the story of how the Catholic faith took root in Ohio. Peter Thomas, a direct descendant of Jacob Dittoe, is the caretaker of the First Mass Memorial site and is promoting the cause for sainthood for Father Edward Dominic Fenwick, O.P., William Noll is the principal and administrator of Holy Trinity Schools in Somerset. Sponsored by the Catholic Record Society, the presentation will occur at the Catholic Foundation, 257 East Broad Street in Columbus, on Sunday, March 26, 2023. 

The Fourth Week of Lent

PROCLAIMING CHRIST

Meditations for the Season of Lent

"The Holy Spirit helps us to view others with fresh eyes, seeing them always as brothers and sisters in Jesus, to be respected and loved."

In today's Gospel Jesus gives sight to a man who was born blind. As the man repeatedly tells the story of how Jesus healed him physically, there is a gradual change in the man's understanding of who Jesus is. He sees Jesus first as a man, and then as a prophet, and then as someone who came from God. Finally, he falls to his knees and worships Jesus as the Lord. This man went from being blind to receiving physical sight to seeing through the eyes of faith.

The religious leaders who were questioning this man had physical sight, but they had no spiritual sight. They were blinded by prejudice, pride, fear, and animosity toward Jesus.

Spiritual sight allows us to recognize the presence of God in our

lives and in the lives of people around us. We strive to love unconditionally as Christ loves.

Spiritual sight is a gift that flows from our relationship with Christ and our deep desire to follow in his footsteps. Once we have received the gift of spiritual sight, nothing is ever the same.

- Laetare Sunday, which is today, marks the halfway point during Lent. Priests wear rose-colored vestments as a reminder that Easter is coming.

ur greatest temptation when faced with people in need is to look away. But when we look away, we turn our backs on Christ himself. Jesus assures us that when we feed the hungry, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit the prisoner, we do these things for him (see Mt 25:31-41).

We all know people who have suffered a death in the family, serious illness, divorce, a job loss, or some other personal tragedy. We have heard shocking stories of violence, oppression, poverty, prejudice, and abuse in our communities and in our world. Maybe you know of people who have been affected by twists of fate, natural disasters, accidents, or injuries. We can't stop bad things from happening. But we can find ways to reach out to people in need. Promise yourself that for the remainder of Lent you will go out of your way to help someone every day.
